2020 National Essay Challenge

Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC)

The IRCC department is launching the 2020 National Essay Challenge (NEC) to support emerging scholars across Canadian universities in policy-relevant research.

The NEC is designed to generate evidence-based insights on IRCC policies. It encourages graduate students to learn more about immigration research and policy, and it raises awareness about the availability of data and supporting resources.

The NEC is open to all disciplines and welcomes empirical research papers related to IRCC's mandate using qualitative or quantitative methodologies. Graduate students with selected essays will be invited to present their research to policy makers in Ottawa (with travel paid) and will receive \$500 towards attendance at an academic conference of their choice.

Deadline to submit your expression of interest: **January 6, 2020.**

If you plan to use Statistics Canada data in the RDC for this essay then you will need to submit your RDC proposal/application by **November 6, 2019.**

2020 National Essay Challenge
Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada

To promote policy-relevant research by emerging scholars, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) is running the 2020 National Essay Challenge for **graduate students** in Canadian universities.

Requirements:

- You **must** be a graduate student enrolled at a Canadian university for the 2019-2020 academic year.
- Your essay must be an **empirical research paper**, using qualitative or quantitative methodologies.
- Your essay cannot be co-authored and you **must** have the support of a professor.

Selected students will receive:

- an IRCC certificate of achievement;
- an invitation to present their essay in Ottawa at an IRCC Research Matters Event (with travel paid);
- \$500 towards an academic conference.

How do I enter?

- First, send an email to IRCC.NEC-CNE.IRCC@cic.gc.ca to access the 2020 National Essay Challenge group on GCcollab, where you will find information about the requirements of the Challenge.
- Once you are a member of the 2020 National Essay Challenge GCcollab group, you will need to submit your expression of interest by **January 6, 2020.**
- If you are planning to access Statistics Canada's Research Data Centres, you will need to have submitted your proposal by **November 6, 2019.**

New Datasets at the RDC

2019 Survey on Health Research Priorities (SHRP)

The CIHR commissioned Statistics Canada to collect information on the health research priorities of Canadians. Health research plays an important role in improving the health of Canadians, delivering more effective health services and strengthening the Canadian health care system. The survey asks questions about: the importance of different types of health research, issues for health researchers to address, obtaining information about health research results, satisfaction with how health research results are shared, and knowledge of health research and its role.

2018 Birth Database (VSBD) and 2018 Stillbirth Database (VSSBD)

The VSBD is an administrative survey that collects demographic information annually from all provincial and territorial vital statistics registries on all live births in Canada. The data are used to calculate basic indicators (such as counts and rates) on births of residents of Canada. Information from this database is also used in the calculation of statistics, such as age-specific fertility rates.

The VSSBD is an administrative survey that collects demographic information annually from all provincial and territorial vital statistics registries on all stillbirths (fetal deaths) in Canada. The data are used to calculate basic indicators (such as counts and rates) on stillbirths of residents of Canada. Information from this database is also used in the calculation of statistics, such as the late fetal death rate and the perinatal death rate.
